



The Shepherds' House

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We finalise our walk with this building, which in its day was a shepherds' house and stable for sheep and goats. It dates back to the 18th Century and was made up of 3 rooms: a resting area for shepherds, an area for goats and sheep and a birthing pen.

Our aim is to faithfully rebuild it with the same materials that they used over 3 centuries ago, and of course, keep sheep. Currently, the herds in this area have disappeared, and with them, the shepherds. The ravines and agricultural estates have lost those who kept them clear by grazing and now it's herbicides and machinery that carry out this function. However, the herds didn't just eat weeds and grass, they also fertilised the land and worked it with their hooves, increasing biodiversity and avoiding fires.

On the table below the wall you can see the materials with which we'll reconstruct this old building: lime, clay, stone, sand, wood, iron and fired earth. All of these are sustainable materials, some are even reused. We invite you to participate in fundraising to help us make this reconstruction project a reality.

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
